## UC DFCM to begin Sawyer Pardo LGBTQ+ Fellowship

UC DFCM faculty member Sarah Pickle, MD recently received an award from an endowment to develop and implement the Sawyer Pardo LGBTQ+ Fellowship. Research Division team member Shanna Stryker, MD MPH will assist with program development and instruction within the fellowship.

The fellowship will have both clinical and scholarly components. The focus will be to: develop competency in LGBTQ+ primary care, including gender-affirming care and hormone therapy, reproductive and sexual health, family planning, and HIV medicine; learn interprofessional community-based behavioral health including identification and management of mental health conditions that are disproportionate in LGBTQ+ populations; understand mixed methods research approaches in addressing health disparities; become trained in curriculum development and design to further medical training in health equity and justice; and learn about health system and community-based program design and integration of interdisciplinary LGBTQ+ medicine programs across specialties.







Fellows will have clinical care experiences at the UC West Chester Hospital Family Medicine Practice. An advocacy and community outreach component of the fellowship will occur at Equitas Health and UC Health Wyoming in addition to Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center.

Research Division team member Daniel Hargraves, MSW, will assist in developing a website that will serve as a one stop site for the program, including applying for the fellowship. The site aims to be launched by July 1, 2023 with the first cohort of fellows beginning July 1, 2024.

Pickle joined Sawyer Pardo, a student at the University of Roehampton and UC Health painter, and Phoebe Pardo, the Clever Crazes for Kids chief operating officer and Sawyer's mother, for an interview on 91.7 WVXU about the current lack of training for LGBTQ+ patients and how the fellowship program emerged. <u>Visit the WVXU website to learn more and listen to the discussion</u>.

## Team members to add new study dimension to project

Saundra Regan, PhD, and Jackie Knapke, PhD, along with the Data and Evaluation Team are working on two sub studies for the statewide Heart Healthy Ohio Initiative: 1). the Collaborative Formation and Effectiveness Survey, which aims to identify best practices when forming a collaborative; and 2). a Comparative Case Study, which aims to identify facilitators and barriers of primary care quality improvement by comparing themes from high-performing and low-performing practice sites. In addition to these, Drs. Regan and Knapke are returning to the three original co-design practices to collect follow-up observational and interview data to learn what went well during codesign and what could be improved.

The goal of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ)-funded collaborative is to expand a nascent statewide cardiovascular health collaborative and establish a sustainable external QI support infrastructure.

## WELLNESS CORNER

#### Social Media and Mental Health

Social media use has exploded in the past decade, especially use by adolescents. Negative stories about online predators and bullying have become common. In response, researchers have been looking at the relationship between social media use and mental health conditions.

Although increased social media use has been linked to symptoms of depression, anxiety, and stress, what you do and who you meet online can mean the difference between helpful and harmful effects.

Depression or anxiety can cause you to isolate yourself. Spending more time online may be a sign of social withdrawal. Online content may also expose users to harmful health behaviors and even make substance use behaviors seem normal.

If you click on things that bother you, you're likely to be shown more of those things. Scrolling through disturbing content can increase stress and anxiety. Extensive use can be especially harmful to users.

Research has also found that passive social media can be more detrimental than active use, which may result in an increase in offline human connections.

Conversely, social media can be a useful tool that helps you find mental health information and treatment options. Members of marginalized groups can connect to support communities. It all depends on how it is used. Mental Health experts recommend limiting the time spent on social media in favor of increased interactions with friends, family, and community.

## Knapke expands Research Division curriculum to graduate course

Research Division team member Jackie Knapke, PhD, has developed a new graduate course for this current semester entitled "Practice and Community Based Healthcare Research." From the syllabus, "This course will introduce students to engagement in community-based research and the delivery of health interventions in community settings."

The course will be a blend of asynchronous, online content and live activities. This includes a blend of the research curriculum the Division has developed for the summer research experience for medical students. Each team member leads a topic area that includes recording a detailed video module and then meeting with the students to discuss an article in the literature or worked-project example of the topic for the week.

Students will be collating these weekly articles into a literature review table to summarize the content as a means of demonstrating comprehension. The course will culminate in a 10 minute presentation from each student that highlights an area of their own research interest and details from a worked project proposal.

Course content will include discussion of development of a research question, literature review, participant recruitment, CITI training and IRB protocols, informed consent, qualitative and quantitative data collection and analysis, community engaged research, and poster and publication development. The team looks forward to expanding their education reach!
